



The Power of the Written Word

Imagine if you couldn't read. Think about it.

Ruoy tsrif evol rettel. A repapswen elcitra taht devom uoy ot sraet. Eht koob taht edam a ecnereffid. Ecneirepxe eht rewop dna erusaelp fo sdrow. daeR.

How do you feel holding these words in your hands . . . a set of instructions, an application for employment, a birthday card . . . words that are foreign to you . . . that have no meaning. There are far too many adults for whom the printed word is foreign even though the words are printed in their native language. Illiteracy is a nationwide problem that is not going away.

Those of us who can read, read constantly. Words are everywhere. Everything we buy is accompanied by the printed word. The package, instructions, warranty, the brochure filled with other products we might need. Once we know how to do it, reading becomes instinctive. For many, reading becomes a passion, a pastime, a pleasure.

It is exciting to know how to read. Most of us grow to love reading during childhood. We help our children discover the magic and the power of the printed word. We take them to the library and they take home stacks of books. They always want just one more. "But," as writer James Trelease said, "books and people do not have Velcro sides . . . there must be a bonding agent — a parent, relative, neighbor, teacher, or librarian — someone who attaches book to reader." More than two million adults in the New York metropolitan area have not yet met that someone.

It is never too late to help someone learn to love the written word. In Suffolk County, the Literacy Volunteers of America provide services to people who need basic reading skills and to people who require help with English as their second language. The Northport-East Northport Public Library is proud to be involved in the Literacy Volunteer Program. Students and tutors work one-to-one and can reserve meeting space for tutoring sessions in the library. Literacy program information and tutor and student applications are available at the reference desk.

In addition to providing a conduit for literacy tutors and adult learners to connect and read, the library has a special collection of "New Reader/Adult Learner" materials. Reference Librarian Rochelle Freed is responsible for acquiring books, newspapers, videos, and audio tapes to help new readers master their new skills. "We commend the many literacy volunteers in our community for the time and effort they give toward the important goal of literacy," said Mrs. Freed.

Libraries house the power of the written word. "Libraries store the energy that fuels the imagination. They inspire us to explore, achieve, and contribute to improving our quality of life," said Sidney Sheldon, author. Everyone should have the opportunity to know the pleasure and power of knowing how to read. The quest for literacy and love of the written word begins at the library.

A Leadership Ladder to Build Better Buildings

During the past several months, we have introduced you to some of the key professionals on the Building Project Team. This month, we highlight the experts you know, the Staff Implementation Team assembled under the leadership of Director Stephanie Heineman and Assistant Director Eileen Minogue. In addition to the Director and Assistant Director, this team includes department heads Carol Brand, Computer and Technical Services; Barbara Dattolico, Circulation; Fred DeGeorge, Buildings and Grounds; Dodie Gillman, Media; Judith Killen, Reference; Margaret Webb, Children's Services; and Branch Librarian Margaret Vespe. This staff implementation team is working with the architects at hands-on design sessions to ensure that plans are complete with components essential to excellent patron service. Before and after each meeting, the implementation team meets with their own departmental staff to enlist their input.

Every day, our staff interacts with you, our patrons. As they strive to provide you with optimal service, they note your concerns and comments and return to planning sessions with their observations and your input. In essence, the new buildings will be designed by everyone who works in and uses the library. "By inviting the participation of those who know the library best, we can achieve the most successful plan . . . one that will require little revision once the construction phase begins. From its very implementation, everyone owns this community project. Our team approach to planning will serve as a model for other libraries pursuing expansion plans," said Library Director Stephanie Heineman.
