

Back issues of periodicals preserve basic facts and contemporary reactions. Newspaper and magazine indexes are available to lead you to articles in old issues of periodicals. In addition to printed indexes, compact discs and online databases are used to locate subject-specific articles. Whatever your browsing interest or research pursuit, professional librarians can help you identify and locate topical magazines and newspapers.

Patrons now have greater access to the magazine collections of the libraries in the Huntington township. A cooperative agreement between the Northport-East Northport, Cold Spring Harbor, Commack, Half Hollow Hills, Harborfields, Huntington, and South Huntington libraries gives patrons from these libraries direct access magazine borrowing privileges. To increase access to our vast and current collection of circulating magazines, all patrons may now borrow magazines for a seven-day loan period.

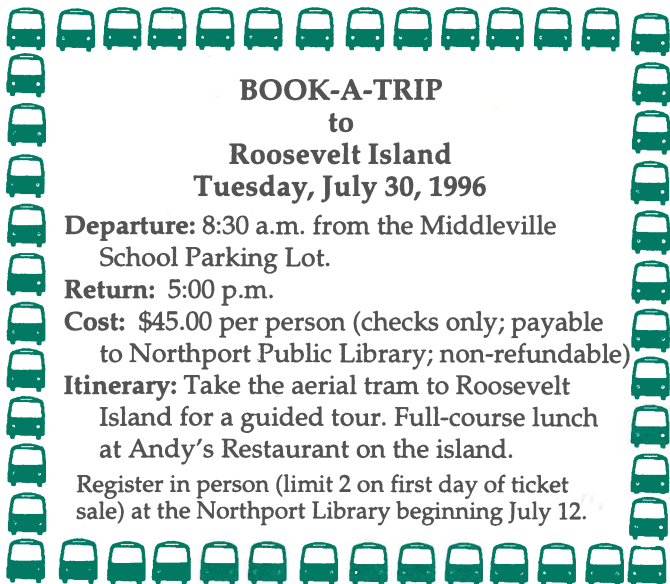

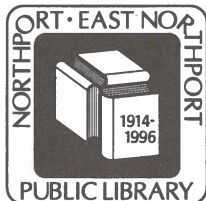
