

HOW WE HELP YOU. How You Depend On Us.

The reasons why you — our patrons — depend upon us are as diverse as the people in the Northport-East Northport community served by the library. Your responses to our recent survey telling us "why you came to the library" illustrate this fact. This month, our LIBRARY CLOSE UP is front page news and it's written by you, our patrons. We've reprinted your responses to share with all of our patrons what we read with great interest and enjoyment. Thank you for your time and input (and keep filling out the forms!).



To pick up a fax. I find it a great convenience.

*Each month, patrons send approximately 75 faxes from the library's "self-service" fax machine.



My three-and-a-half-year-old daughter enjoys reading stories together, playing computer games, and doing new puzzles. I think it stimulates her mind so I enjoy bringing her here.

*Each month an average of 500 children use the computers at Northport and East Northport.

*The library also works with the local schools lending library materials to the teachers for classroom use. Last year, 563 items were borrowed by the schools through our Special Loan Service For Our Schools.

> *At last count we owned 7,186 videos. Want to view a video that we don't own? We may be able to borrow it from another library or consider it for purchase for our own collection.



I came because the children's programs are so wonderful. All my children are involved in storytime programs. I also do research for arts and crafts for all my extra-curricular activities.



Read the New York Times. Take out two CDs. Read microfilm.

*Our microfilm collection of New York Times dates back to 1960, and we have access to New York Times microfilm dating back to 1851.

To rendezvous with my spouse and to check travel guides.

*Wherever your travels may take you, your itinerary should include a stop at the library for travel guides, hotel listings, maps, and airline schedules.

To return a book I had finished and to take out some children's videos for my grandchildren who are visiting this weekend.

*The library has videos for children of all ages in the Children's Room including some of the classics that we never outgrow.

To access back issues of Journal of the American Medical Association, etc.

*On the Health Information Database you can search medical topics and print out the text of articles from numerous medical journals.

To find a monologue to audition for the Northport High School's "Powdered Wigs" play, The Pajama Game.

*We have more than 30 books on the topic "monologues" and many more books on plays. Hope you got the part!

To do research for a book I am writing and to look for titles for my book group.

*You may want to check BOOK REVIEW DIGEST, FICTION CATALOG, and CONTEMPORARY AUTHORS when preparing for book discussions. Ask a reference librarian for these and other helpful sources.

To get classical music CDs. I love Schubert especially.

*We have 29 titles by Schubert alone on CD.

I came to the library today to get some good, interesting books to read! I am retired, a senior citizen, and in my spare time (aside from doting on my grandchildren) I love to read. I appreciate the wide selection of books. I would like to see some kind of Senior program that I could attend.

*Our Prime Time programs are especially for seniors. Not for enjoyable for seniors eniors are the Novel Ideas, Book and Sandwich (W)rap, and Great Books discussion groups. Check the newsletter each month for a schedule of all library-sponsored programs.


S.A.T. PREPARATION WORKSHOP

In Our Bright Idea Box



When I spoke with Mrs. Lieberman I told her she was not alone in her concern. Over the past three years, we've had 17 noise-related bright ideas. Providing quiet is very important to us, but certain noises are beyond our control. Our telephone system, almost 20 years old, is outdated. All incoming calls must be routed through the circulation desk. The close quarters also inhibit our efforts to contain the normal "noises" involved in running a library — computers, printers, copy machines, and patrons checking out materials or making reference inquiries. Sound travels and these "business as usual" sounds don't have far to travel in our close quarters. One solution has been our "Sunday Study Hall." Two Sundays each month, we open the meeting room for quiet study and reading. Also, we've turned off the telephone intercom in the Prime Time Room, an area adopted by patrons for quiet study. However, until we have more space and a better phone system, toning down the less-than-optimal noise levels will be a challenge without an immediate solution. We appreciate and share your concern.

Information Pulaski Road PROPERTY


The 2¹/4 acres on Pulaski Road gifted to the library by the Gildersleeve family border a 23-acre tract of land for development as a residential community. Land is now being cleared for these new homes. The shovels and bull-dozers you see on Pulaski Road are not

breaking ground on library property. The use of the library's Pulaski Road property is one of the possibilities the Library Board plans to explore in its search for a solution to your library buildings' problems. No decision has been made — nor can any construction take place — without approval by you, our community taxpayers.

HOW WE'VE MATURED

What a difference a couple of decades makes. When the present library building opened in 1966 the community was invited into a spacious and tranquil environment for quiet reading and study. Today the library handles a multitude of information in a variety of formats — we are managing an electronic information revolution. In addition to books, magazines, and microfilm, the library now offers audio books, compact discs, and videos. Another noticeable addition to the library's layout is the computer — or shall we say the many computers. Our girth has widened in our maturity and the numbers bear that out. Over the past twenty-seven years, circulation has increased over 42%, the number of cardholders has more than tripled, collections have grown beyond available shelf space, and room has been made for more sophisticated equipment.
