

Purpose — To approve the annual appropriations for 1994/95 and to elect a trustee.

Vote — Monday, April 11, 9:00 a.m. to 9:00 p.m. Northport Library Building

Who Can Vote — anyone who is

- At least 18 years of age;
 A citizen of the United States;
- 3. A resident of the Northport-East Northport School District for at least 30 days;
- 4. Registered to vote.

If you have not voted within four years in a general, school, or library election, reregistration is required.

Registration may be made in person prior to April 6 at the following locations: 1) any school in the district between the hours of 9:00 a.m. and 3:00 p.m., any day that school is in session; 2) the offices of the School District Clerk, 110 Elwood Road, Northport, Monday through Friday from 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m.

You may register prior to April 1 at the Suffolk County Board of Elections, Yaphank Ave., Yaphank, Monday through Friday from 9:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.

You may register by mail using application forms available in both library buildings. Applications must be received at the Suffolk County Board of Elections no later than March 17.



HOW WE STACK UP

Looking at the Northport-East Northport Library Buildings 28 Years Later

In 1966, when we first opened the doors to the Northport Library on Laurel Avenue and the expanded branch on Larkfield Road in East Northport, our circulation was 393,689. In 1992, our library had the third highest number of items loaned per person in the county. Last year, our circulation rose 4.3% to 566,540.

Extraordinary growth in usage has created the need for a greater amount and variety of space.

No room for materials:

- Shelves are filled to capacity.
- · Tables have been removed.
- Shelving has been built under staircases and over windows — everywhere possible.
- Some of the collection has been discarded.

No room for people:


- It is impossible to find a place to sit at busy times.
- Demand for the use of our meeting room is so great that we are forced to turn away many groups requesting its use.
- · Quiet study space is nonexistent.

The noise level in the building is difficult to control because of the crowded and cramped conditions. Computer technology has become a critical tool in the Library's provision of service and information, but we have neither the space nor the electrical capacity for the necessary equipment. Our responsibility is to provide service to everyone in the community but accessibility to the building and services is almost impossible for our disabled patrons. Services such as videos, audio books, and compact discs did not even exist when this building was planned. These services have grown to become an important and popular part of the collection.

In sum, the library is much too small for the amount of business that we do.

Comparing the Northport-East Northport Public Library to Other Libraries

There is no other library exactly like the Northport-East Northport Public Library. But, to judge our present performance needs, we can look at libraries in Suffolk County that serve populations of 25,000 or more. We have the third largest circulation per person and we do it in the fifth smallest amount of space per person. In comparison to our neighbors, the Half Hollow Hills Community Library and the Harborfields Public Library have more than twice the square footage per person.

The Children's Room in Northport has lost its personal touch. It's too crowded. What do we need all those machines for? It's too noisy. When the librarians are answering telephone reference questions they can be heard all over. My children knew the library as a quiet place of escape. But now when I bring my grandchildren here it's not like that any more.

We pay attention. We listen hard.
Let us turn your bright idea into action!

It's true, our children will recollect the library as a different place from the quiet sanctuaries of our own childhood. Technology has changed the library's role, opening a door to wonder that is beyond the covers of a book. Machines have been squeezed in corners of what was once a spacious library. Every nook and cranny is used for library materials that our children expect to find at the library today. Because of this, the only table areas for reading are quite close to the reference and circulation desks and the children's computing area. Reference questions have to be answered. Patrons checking out materials or inquiring about circulation matters have to be addressed. Without more space, typical library sounds will continue to intrude readers' quiet thoughts. However, the library is more than the building — and the library will never outgrow the personal attention that all children receive from the caring and dedicated staff in the Children's Room.
