





THE PRIME TIME "ALCOVE"

What is now the Prime Time "Alcove" was originally designed as a quiet reading area. In the early 1970s it became the home for the Library's fine collection of art books. The art book collection grew beyond the shelving capacity of this room. In 1989 it was returned to the mezzanine shelves and interfiled in numerical order with other non-fiction books. The main floor is most accessible for patrons who might have difficulties climbing to the Library's second level; therefore, a decision was made to move the books most read by senior patrons to what is now our Prime Time Alcove. Here magazines, books, and pamphlets on topics of specific interest to patrons who are retired or are considering retirement can be Prime Time found. In addition to the special biographies have collection, large-print books and

found a home here. The Prime Time Alcove is also used for mini-lecture programs, registrations for Book-A-Trips, HIICAP Medicare Counseling, and blood pressure screening. The weekly Knitters' Circle stitches its creations here, and recently a local chess group adopted this area for its quiet and concentrated play. There is a Prime Time collection at the East Northport Library, shelved with the general collection because there is no room to create a designated Prime Time corner. However, East Northport Prime Timers are active in the Book & Sandwich (W)rap short story discussion group; receive AARP tax assistance; meet with HIICAP Medicare Counselors; and stop by for monthly blood pressure screenings. In East Northport, it's the Children's Room which shares its space for these scheduled Prime Time activities.
