
Your Public Library Merging Technology and Patron Service


Traffic on the information highway is bumper to bumper. Information "commuters" recognize the library as an information right of way. By obtaining information via the systems in place at your library, patrons — in essence — enter an HOV (high occupancy vehicle) lane for information access. Libraries are merging technology with personal service to make information more accessible.

Your library is a test driver on the information highway. Each day, your reference librarians map out ways to arrive at information that will answer reference questions. They participate in state-of-the-art-technology trial programs and attend training workshops. In striving to provide patrons with optimal service, your librarians are continually learning and can in turn help patrons learn how to best use new data sources.

For several years, the library has been accessing on-line databases to answer reference questions. By using a telephone modem, librarians dial up medical, educational, news, financial, scientific, and literary information resources and "search" for data that meets a patron's research needs. Online data serves to supplement the print material available on library shelves, and tends to be most useful for time-sensitive information.

The library subscribes to a network of compact disc resources (CD-Net). Again, the librarian telephones the databank of discs via a modem and initiates a search for data. CD-Net includes financial data from the Securities and Exchange Commission, medical and educational indexes and abstracts, a national telephone book, a trade database, and information related to the Americans with Disabilities Act. The library also subscribes to several compact disc products including NEWSDAY; Billboard Magazine's PHONOLOG, a search tool for musical recordings; and PRO-DIRECT, a business telephone directory. Many of the library's basic





magazine and newspaper indexes are now housed on computers. These indexes span several years and often include abstracts and full-text. Your library's upcoming plans include the implementation of ARTFACT, a compact disc database that indexes and reproduces text from major art auction catalogs. ARTFACT will be a research complement to the library's extensive files of art catalogs.

A t PC Station, public computers are available for adult and young adult patrons to use word processing, tax preparation, college selection, resume writing, spreadsheet development, and many other applications.

omputers and software are also available to help children develop reading, language, history, science, and basic skills. There are more than 250 programs for use on the children's computers. Multi-media has also made an in-road in the children's room in Northport. Illustrated, animated, and sound-enhanced, multi-media brings children closer to research topics and allows them to become part of the new worlds they explore. New technologies provide something for every child's interest.

But what of the most recent techno-talk taking place on the information highway — the Internet? What is the Internet and where are its "entrance ramps?" The Internet provides a conduit to millions of computers, routing users to local and global networks. These networks communicate in the same language and allow for the easy exchange of data. Resources accessible on the Internet include hundreds of thousands of databases from throughout the world. Electronic mail is another popular feature of the Internet. Your library is exploring the Internet and evaluating its use in the public library. Direct patron access to the Internet is still down the road.

Patrons continue to read and talk about "what's new."
Curious and anxious to explore new technologies, patrons can turn to their public libraries first for new connections.
