



JAZZ PIANIST ADAM MAKOWICZ

Friday, October 28 8:00 p.m.

Following Judy Tracy's untimely death in 1992, her colleagues at the Northport Rotary presented the library with a gift of matching funds toward sponsorship of an annual jazz concert to

remember Judy, a Rotarian who loved jazz.

This year's concert, co-sponsored by the Rotary Club of Northport, is the second in memory of the late Judy Tracy.

Adam Makowicz, the celebrated Polish pianist, performs at the Northport Library. The phenomenal Makowicz technique and the inventiveness of his jazz interpretations leave audiences gasping and critics groping for words to describe his performances.

With the fall of the Iron Curtain, Mr. Makowicz has made annual triumphal tours of his native Poland. Now a Concord recording artist, Mr. Makowicz has more than 25 albums of his own, 13 of which were made after his emigration to the U.S. in 1977.

Tickets, which go on sale Oct. 15, are \$1.00 for adults, 50¢ for students, senior citizens, and persons who are disabled.

Information Knows No **BOUNDS:**

An Overview of Library Resources for People with Disabilities

The most valuable commodity in today's society is information. To people with disabilities, information is particularly essential. The library can help the community's nearly 1 out of 5 people with disabilities maximize their abilities to participate fully in everyday life. In the dictionary, the pronunciation of the word

"disability" puts the accent on "able." The library's collection of resources has the same accent.

While the physical structures of the library buildings can be limiting for patrons with mobility difficulties, our resources are used regularly by patrons with a variety of

disabilities. The following books, databases, audiovisual materials, and assistive devices highlight a collection that reflects the philosophy that a person is not disabled, but "differently abled."

The *Disability Information Access Library (DIAL)* is a central network of specialized disability-related databases. It is a project of the Suffolk Cooperative Library System and is available through the reference services in Northport. The databases include *CD-Blind*, a national union catalog of braille and recorded books



for people with print impairments; DOS-Abledata, a database of over 19,000 adaptive products for people with disabilities; Satirn II, an information and referral database of New York State agencies and organizations; and autoBOOK: ADA, a uniquely-indexed, computer-accessible edition of the Americans with Disabilities Act

regulations and supplemental materials.

Best-selling adult fiction as well as non-fiction books are available in large print including popular topics such as cooking, gardening, health and medicine, and biographies. In regular print, the adult nonfiction collection includes books on access to cultural institu-

tions, travel, pregnancy, gardening, and much more. The New York Times, The World at Large, Reader's Digest, and Guideposts are some of the newspapers and magazines available in large print. The pamphlet collection contains timely and helpful information about disabilities and available resources.

The audio-visual collection includes closed-caption videos, clearly labeled for easy identification. Audio books are useful for people with learning disabilities or sight impairments as well as recreational "reading."

Audio books by favorite authors are also available in the Young Adult collection and are enjoyed by youngsters who need reading encouragement. A new and growing collection of large-print books for young adults

includes popular fiction, series titles, and helpful "howto" guides.

Our Children's collection enlightens readers and helps

them develop an understanding and sensitivity to the challenges faced by people with disabilities.

Braille books are available for children. Picture books include raised illustrations. *Expectations* is a multivolume braille anthology of current children's literature. A braille copy of the U. S. Constitution is available.

Large-print fiction books, sign language books, talking books, and closed-caption videos are also available for children.

The library offers assistance in a variety of ways. Staff will bring materials from anywhere in our collections to patrons in the library. Technical devices also assist. A Kurzweil personal reader machine generously donated by Col. Harold Leschziner "reads aloud" books to patrons, page by page. "Loud and clear phones" amplify conversation between staff and patrons. A computer screen enlarger magnifies text up to two times its original size. Public telephones are equipped with volume



control selectors. Patrons who are deaf or hearing impaired and use telecommunications devices for the deaf (TDD) can call the library using the New York Relay Center. Calls are returned via the Relay Center. The Suffolk Cooperative Library

System will lend, for limited time, telecaption decoders, telecommunication devices for the deaf, a Perkins brailler, and a beamscope television screen enlarger.

If you can't get to the library, we'll send the books to you. Through the library's *Homeward Bound Books* program, books are mailed to the homes of residents who are physically unable to visit the library.

All residents of the Northport-East Northport community are encouraged to take full advantage of their public library. Library Director Stephanie Heineman has organized the *ABLE Advisors* to look into ways to increase access to the library and its resources. We'll introduce you to these advisors in next month's newsletter.
