


The gift, which is unrestricted, has been invested in a special fund for use in our future building project. Such demonstration of appreciation and support is gratifying to all of us who love the library.



#### A Letter from Your Library Board of Trustees

Dear Neighbor:

Ben Franklin once said, "The library is the measure of a community's learning and culture." If that is true, the Northport-East Northport community is indeed special. Eighty-five percent of all community residents are library patrons — one of the highest percentages in Suffolk County. Library circulation has been growing at the rate of about 5% annually. Our activities and programs for patrons of all ages play to overflow crowds.

In spite of our successes, our patrons are also aware there are serious problems facing our library. We no longer have enough space to add a book without disposing of one. Every available space has been used for equipment. Seating, storage and counter space are woefully inadequate; electrical systems can no longer support increased demands and parking problems are common. Existing programs cannot be expanded to meet demands and new programs cannot be considered.

The Library Board of Trustees and the professional staff have been working to address these problems. We have held meetings with community members and our monthly newsletter sent to each household has kept everyone up to date on our progress. For some time we have been educating the community to the recognized benefits of a single central library over the two libraries we now operate. New and developing library technologies, such as on-line public access catalog, reference applications on CD-ROM, computer network for resource sharing, on-line acquisition and cataloging, and on-line access versus on-site access, are more efficiently and more economically accommodated in a single location with a single staff. One facility would eliminate duplication of spaces, and overlap of services, a duplication of collections and equipment, and additional staff. Furthermore, some members of the community believe that a new central library would be a unifying influence within the community.

The construction of this central library has been, of course, dependent upon the availability of an appropriate site. Our community, of 35,784 people, is spread out and heavily developed. In reality, few sites with the desirable combination of convenience, accessibility, size, topography and availability are to be found. For several years the Trustees and the professional staff have looked for an appropriate site for a central library.

The Dickinson Avenue Elementary School property was identified years ago as a potential site for a central library. A proposal for the construction of a central library on the Dickinson Avenue site was presented to the Board of Education at its September 21, 1992 meeting. This was followed by a meeting on November 12th in the library with members of the community. At both meetings representatives from the Dickinson Avenue neighborhood voiced strong reservations over what they considered the negative impact a building project would have on the corner of Catherine Street and Dickinson Avenue. What was equally as strong was their support of the library's need for expansion. Our goal to find a solution to our building problem could not ignore the core of our success, our patrons. We have, therefore, withdrawn our request for the School Board to share the Dickinson Avenue site for a central library.

The School Board has suggested that the library consider the now closed Middleville Junior High School on Middleville Road as a building for a central library. The Library Board and professional staff have toured the Middleville site with our architects and thoroughly analyzed its feasibility in detail.

Although the school comprises about 120,000 square feet on 34 acres, only about one-quarter of the building the auditorium, cafeteria, library, shops and music room — are adaptable to contemporary library functions. The classroom units are connected by enclosed walkways and are unusable for library purposes. The gym is detached and equally remote.

With less than 30,000 adaptable square feet, a new addition of about 30,000 feet would be required. Renovation of the adaptable one-quarter of the existing space at Middleville would require the replacement of 40-year-old systems, the removal of asbestos and reconstruction so extensive as to cost practically as much as a new library. There are other disadvantages of the Middleville site that outweigh the few dollars which might be saved:

- The site is not well situated and could be inaccessible to many community members.
- The available parking is located at a distance from the entry necessitating a difficult climb uphill for the elderly or disabled.
- The spread-out California-style of the school presents serious problems for heating and airconditioning.
- Utilization of the cafeteria, auditorium, shops, library and music room would virtually eliminate the future use of Middleville as a school.
- Uncertainties about future uses or sales of the remaining buildings and property constitute potential problems for the safe and efficient operation of a library on the Middleville site.
- The presence of a library on the most central spot on the 34 acres may limit the Board of Education's options in its effort to market the property.

The use of the Middleville School site for a central library is not an appropriate option.

As elected representatives we are charged with the dual mandate of listening to our patrons' views and making our best judgment about the means of providing quality library services at reasonable costs. In this regard we will continue to consider other properties and keep you informed. When our alternatives are clearly defined, we will ask you to respond to a survey designed to help us develop a specific proposal for a future referendum.
