PLANNING FOR THE NURSING HOME

He will explore such topics as transfer of residence, separation of liquid assets, the Medicaid Qualifying Trust, life insurance, power of attorney, and wills. No registration is necessary.

DEFENSIVE DRIVING COURSE

Monday, January 23 & Tuesday, January 24 7:00-10:00 p.m.

Mr. David Decker of the National Safety Council will present a six-hour Defensive Driving Course. Completing the course will qualify motorists for a reduction of 10% on their motor vehicle insurance premium for collision and liability each year for three years, as well as a reduction of three points on their driving record. Registration applications may be picked up at the library beginning January 7, and there is a \$35 fee.

MEDICARE/MEDICAID ASSISTANCE

Health insurance coverage has become increasingly complicated for older Americans. The library provides one-to-one assistance through Jim McManus, an AARPtrained representative, on Friday mornings from 9:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon at the Northport Library. Mr. McManus will answer questions about Medicare and supplemental Medicare health insurance. He will also help fill out Medicare claims and appeals, help determine Medicaid eligibility and refer beneficiaries with complex Medicare problems to the appropriate resources for assistance. Please call the Northport Library to make an appointment with Mr. McManus.

YEAR OF THE YOUNG READER

Books and reading are the basic nourishment of a growing mind. Developing children into readers today is the best way to ensure a literate and informed Nation of Readers tomorrow. To remind Americans of the joys and importance of books for children and young adults, the Librarian of Congress, James H.



Billington, has designated 1989 as The Year of the Young Reader.

Initiated by the Center for the Book and the Children's Literature Center in the Library of Congress, this national, year-long campaign provides families, parents, guardians, and concerned individuals, as well as schools, libraries, businesses and other organizations, with a unifying theme to support reading activities. Our common goal is to give young people the gift and the promise of reading.

1989 — The Year of the Young Reader is a theme for everyone to use, adapt, or imitate. By working together we can stimulate a love of reading among our young people that will last all their lives; we also can create new attitudes that will enable good children's books and young minds to flourish. The Librarian of Congress states the case succinctly: "The enterprise of reading is of central importance to the health of the Republic. In this country we have an urgent need to bring more young people into creative contact with books, reading, and libraries."

Ideas For Families

- Read books aloud to each other
- Talk about the books you read
- Keep books and magazines around the home
- Give books and magazine subscriptions as gifts
- Encourage a child to get a library card
- Make regular family visits to the library
- Help a child compile and illustrate a book
- Reread a book you loved as a child, then share it with a child
- Make the bedtime story a regular family event
- Visit a bookstore with a child
- Help a child set up a personal library
- Help children choose books they want to read
- Use television and radio to encourage reading
- Encourage a child to write stories, a diary, letters to friends
- Plan a summer reading program
- Set family reading goals

Friday, January 6, 9:00 p.m.




