INCOME TAX TIME AGAIN!

The reference department also has an assortment of Federal Tax Guide Reports, published by Commerce Clearing House, which explain a variety of special tax situations. Some of the titles in this collection are Tax Aspects of Charitable Giving; Tax Benefits for Homeowners; Your Doctor, Your Druggist, and Your Taxes; Divorce: How It Affects Your Income Taxes; and Tax-Saving Plans for the Self-Employed.
