In an effort to clarify the issue of electric utility costs on Long Island, and the question of public vs. private ownership, the Northport Chamber of Commerce and the Library are co-sponsoring two evenings of discussion on these topics. A speaker representing one point of view will be presented each night and time will be provided for questions from the audience. The first speaker, on April 16, will be Marge Harrison from Long Island Public Power Project. The April 23 speaker will be a representative from LILCO.

BREAST RECONSTRUCTION: THE ALTERNATIVES Tuesday, April 29, 7:30 p.m.

Breast cancer is one of the most common cancers in American women, with approximately 90,000 cases reported every year. The prognosis for this type of cancer has improved considerably, and yet thousands of survivors are left with the trauma of having undergone a masectomy. Dr. Candido Fuentes-Felix, a plastic and reconstructive surgeon, will outline and show examples of the alternatives for breast reconstruction. He will discuss who is a good candidate for breast reconstruction and when it should be done. A question and answer period will follow.



We are installing a Gaylord Computerized Circulation System to improve our service to you. Perhaps you have already seen computer bar code labels above the back book pockets of some of our books. At a later date, you will receive a new library card with a bar code on it which will be read by computers at our Circulation Desk.

Our new computerized circulation system is designed to facilitate:

- check out and return of library materials
- borrower registration
- filling of patron reserves and interlibrary loan requests
- access to holdings of other Gaylord computerized libraries
- issuance of overdue notices and statements
- compilation of statistical data

IMPORTANT VOTING FACTS FOR 1986/87 LIBRARY BUDGET

VOTE - TUESDAY, APRIL 1 FROM 10:00 a.m. to 9:00 P.M. AT THE NORTHPORT LIBRARY.

TRUSTEE - One Library Trustee will be elected for a five year term.

WHO CAN VOTE - Anyone who is:

- 1. At least 18 years of age;
- 2. A citizen of the United States;
- 3. A resident of Northport-East Northport School District for at least 30 days;
- 4. Registered to vote.

Preregistration is required if a person has not voted within two years in a general, school, or library election. Registration may be made in person at the following locations: 1) any school in the district between the hours of 9:00 a.m. and 3:00 p.m., any day that school is in session; 2) at the offices of the School District Clerk, 110 Elwood Road, Northport, Monday through Friday from 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m.; 3) at the Suffolk County Board of Elections, Yaphank Avenue, Yaphank, Monday through Friday from 9:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.; and 4) by mail to the Suffolk County Board of Elections using application forms available at both Library buildings.
